Teaching Narrative Writing: The Cliff Notes

Introduce the genre:
 Share examples of narrative writing Use what they know about text structure to understand how a narrative is structured (sequential) Deconstruct a sample narrative into a narrative graphic organizer (Flee Map). Create a common definition Analyze the Prompt:
 Model for students how to break down a narrative prompt.
Teach the parts of a narrative:
 Decide the main character and supporting characters. What traits does the character(s) have? What is their motivation for their actions? Where will the story take place? How does the setting affect the story? Will the location change? Why? Situation (problem) What problem does the character face? Events/Solution What events happen as the character tries to solve the problem? How does the problem get solved/ending? Break the writing into separate parts to help students build their capacity
to writing a whole story.
 Describe the character Describe the setting Describe the problem and explain why it is a problem List the events that lead to the solution/ending. Connect all of the parts into a story by adding in transitions as needed to make the story flow.
Complete a Map/Prewrite and follow the writing process to complete
