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PITTSBURG UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT MEASURE E BOND BUILDING FUND INTRODUCTION AND CITIZENS' BOND OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE MEMBER LISTING JUNE 30, 2019

Pittsburg Unified School District ("the District") was established in 1933 and covers approximately 61 square miles. The District provides education for grades K-12 and is currently operating eight elementary schools, three junior high schools, one high school, one continuation school, and an adult education center.

On November 2, 2004, the voters of Contra Costa County approved by more than 55% Measure E, authorizing the issuance and sale of \$40,500,000 of general obligation bonds. On March 9, 2005, the District issued Series A of the Election of 2004 General Obligation Bonds in the amount of \$17,100,000. On June 8, 2006, the District issued Series B of the Election of 2004 General Obligation Bonds in the amount of \$13,350,000. On September 26, 2007, the District issued Series C of the Election of 2004 General Obligation Bonds in the amount of \$13,350,000. On September 26, 2007, the District issued Series C of the Election of 2004 General Obligation Refunding Bonds. The Bonds were issued to advance refund a portion of the Election of 2004, Series A Bonds and current refund the 2003 Refunding Bonds. The refunding transaction resulted in a net savings to the District of approximately \$835,000. On June 3, 2015, the District issued \$37,625,000 in General Obligation Refunding Bonds. The Bonds were issued to advance refund a portion of 2004, Series B and Election of 2006, Series B Bonds (Measure J). The refunding transaction resulted in a net savings to the District of 2006, Series B Bonds (Measure J). The refunding transaction resulted in a net savings to the District of 2006, Series B Bonds (Measure J).

Measure E was a Proposition 39 bond. The passage of Proposition 39 in November 2000 amended the California Constitution to include accountability measures. Specifically, the District must conduct an annual independent performance audit to ensure that funds have been expended only on the specific projects listed as well as an annual, independent financial audit of the proceeds from the sale of the bonds until all of the proceeds have been expended for facilities projects.

Upon passage of Proposition 39, an accompanying piece of legislation, AB 1908 (Chapter 44, Statutes of 2000), was also enacted, which amended the Education Code to establish additional procedures which must be followed if a District seeks approval of a bond measure pursuant to the 55% majority authorized in Measure E including formation, composition and purpose of the Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee, and authorization for injunctive relief against the improper expenditure of bond proceeds.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

Measure E Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee and Governing Board Members of the Pittsburg Unified School District Pittsburg, California

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Measure E Bond Building Fund of Pittsburg Unified School District (the "District"), as of and for the year ended June 30, 2019, and the related notes to the financial statements, as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

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Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Measure E Bond Building Fund of Pittsburg Unified School District, as of June 30, 2019, and the changes in financial position thereof for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Emphasis of Matter

As discussed in Note 1A, the financial statements present only the Measure E Bond Building Fund and do not purport to, and do not present fairly the financial position of the Pittsburg Unified School District, as of June 30, 2019, the changes in its financial position for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our opinion is not modified with respect to this matter.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated March 12, 2020, on our consideration of the District's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters specific to the Measure E Bond Building Fund. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the Measure E Bond Building Fund's internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the District's internal control over financial reporting over financial reporting and compliance.

Report of Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

In accordance with the requirements of Proposition 39, as incorporated in California Constitution Article 13A, we have issued our performance audit dated March 12, 2020, on our consideration of the District's compliance with the requirements of Proposition 39 as it directly relates to the Measure E Bond Building Fund. That report is an integral part of our audit of the Measure E Bond Building Fund of Pittsburg Unified School District, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2019, and should be considered in assessing the results of our financial audit.

NOTE 1 – SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

A. <u>Reporting Entity</u>

Pittsburg Unified School District ("the District") was established in 1933 and covers approximately 61 square miles. The District provides education for grades K-12 and is currently operating eight elementary schools, three junior high schools, one high school, one continuation school, and an adult education center.

On November 4, 2004 the District voters authorized \$40,500,000 in general obligation bonds (Measure E) to build new classrooms and schools and continuing the renovation and modernization of local schools. Also, Pittsburg Unified School District was authorized to repair, replace, acquire, construct and renovate school facilities and equipment.

An advisory committee to the District's Governing Board and Superintendent, called the Measure E Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee, was established. The Committee's oversight goals include: advising on bond construction priorities, reviewing school bond construction plans, verifying the project plans are in alignment with the budget, and ensuring compliance with the conditions of Measure E.

The statements presented are for the individual Measure E Bond Building Fund of the District consisting of net construction proceeds of Series A, Series B, Series C, and refunding general obligation bonds as issued by the District, through the County of Contra Costa, and are not intended to be a complete presentation of the District's financial position or results of operations.

B. Accounting Policies

The District accounts for its financial transactions in accordance with the policies and procedures of the California Department of Education's *California School Accounting Manual*. The accounting policies of the District conform to generally accepted accounting principles as prescribed by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board ("GASB") and the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants ("AICPA").

C. Basis of Accounting

Basis of accounting refers to when revenues and expenditures are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. Basis of accounting relates to the timing of measurement made, regardless of the measurement focus applied.

The financial statements are presented on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recorded when susceptible to accrual; i.e., both measurable and available. "Available" means the resources will be collected within the current fiscal year or are expected to be collected soon enough thereafter to be used to pay liabilities of the current fiscal year. Expenditures are generally recognized under the modified accrual basis of accounting when the related liability is incurred.

NOTE 1 – SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

D. Encumbrances

Encumbrance accounting is used in all budgeted funds to reserve portions of applicable appropriations for which commitments have been made. Encumbrances are recorded for purchase orders, contracts, and other commitments when they are written. Encumbrances are liquidated when the commitments are paid.

E. Cash and Investments

In accordance with Education Code Sections 15357 and 41001, the District maintains a portion of its cash in the Contra Costa County Treasury. The county pools these funds with those of other districts in the county and invests the cash. These pooled funds are carried at cost, which approximates market value. Interest earned is deposited quarterly into participating funds. Any investment losses are proportionately shared by all funds in the pool.

F. Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

G. Budgets and Budgetary Accounting

Annual budgets are adopted on a basis consistent with generally accepted accounting principles for all government funds. By state law, the District's Governing Board must adopt a budget no later than July 1. A public hearing must be conducted to receive comments prior to adoption. The District's Governing Board satisfied these requirements.

These budgets are revised by the District's Governing Board during the year to give consideration to unanticipated income and expenditures. Formal budgetary integration was employed as a management control device during the year for all budgeted funds. The District employs budget control by minor object and by individual appropriation accounts. Expenditures cannot legally exceed appropriations by major object account.

NOTE 1 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

H. Fund Balance

Under GASB Statement No. 54, fund balance is divided into five classifications based primarily on the extent to which the District is bound to observe constraints imposed upon the use of the resources in the governmental funds. The fund balance in Measure E is considered restricted.

The restricted fund balance classification reflects amounts subject to externally imposed and legally enforceable constraints. Such constraints may be imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments, or may be imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.

I. Interfund Borrowing

The District's policy is to comply with Education Code Section 42603, which permits temporary borrowing between funds so long as the temporary loan is repaid in the same fiscal year; or in the following fiscal year if the transfer took place within the final 120 calendar days of a fiscal year. The borrowing shall occur only when the fund or account receiving the money will earn sufficient income during the fiscal year to repay the amount transferred. In addition, no more than 75 percent of the maximum moneys held in any fund or account during a current fiscal year may be transferred.

NOTE 2 – CASH AND INVESTMENTS

Summary of Cash and Investments

As of June 30, 2019, the Measure E Bond Building Fund held a balance in the cash in county treasury in the amount of \$71,038.

Policies and Practices

The District is authorized under California Government Code to make direct investments in local agency bonds, notes, or warrants within the State; U.S. Treasury instruments; registered State warrants or treasury notes; securities of the U.S. Government, or its agencies; bankers acceptances; commercial paper; certificates of deposit placed with commercial banks and/or savings and loan companies; repurchase or reverse repurchase agreements; medium term corporate notes; shares of beneficial interest issued by diversified management companies, certificates of participation, obligations with first priority security; and collateralized mortgage obligations. Investments of debt proceeds held by trustees are governed by the provisions of debt agreements rather than the general provisions of the California Government Code. These provisions allow for the acquisition of investment agreements with maturities up to 30 years.

Cash in County Treasury – The District is considered to be an involuntary participant in an external investment pool as the District is required to deposit all receipts and collections of monies with their County Treasurer (Education Code Section 41001). The fair value of the District's investment in the pool is reported in the accounting financial statements at amounts based upon the District's pro-rata share of the fair value provided by the County Treasurer for the entire portfolio (in relation to the amortized cost of that portfolio). The balance available for withdrawal is based on the accounting records maintained by the County Treasurer, which is recorded on the amortized cost basis.

NOTE 2 – CASH AND INVESTMENTS (continued)

General Authorizations

Except for investments by trustees of debt proceeds, the authority to invest District funds deposited with the county treasury is delegated to the County Treasurer and Tax Collector. The table below identifies examples of the investment types permitted in the investment policy:

Limitations as they relate to interest rate risk, credit risk, and concentration of credit risk are described below:

Interest Rate Risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that changes in market interest rates will adversely affect the fair value of an investment. Generally, the longer the maturity of an investment, the greater the sensitivity of its fair value to changes in market interest rates. The District manages its exposure to interest rate risk by investing in the County Treasury. The District maintains an investment with the Contra Costa County Investment Pool with a fair value of approximately \$71,343 and an amortized book value of \$71,038. The weighted average days to maturity for this pool are 174 days.

NOTE 2 – CASH AND INVESTMENTS (continued)

Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk that an issuer of an investment will not fulfill its obligation to the holder of the investment. This is measured by the assignment of a rating by a nationally recognized statistical rating organization. The investments in the County Treasury are not required to be rated. As of June 30, 2019, the pooled investments in the County Treasury were rated AAAf/S1+ by Standard and Poor's.

Concentration of Credit Risk

The investment policy of the District contains no limitations on the amount that can be invested in any one issuer beyond the amount stipulated by the California Government Code. District investments that are greater than 5 percent of total investments are in either an external investment pool or mutual funds and are therefore exempt.

Fair Value

The District categorizes the fair value measurements of its investments based on the hierarchy established by generally accepted accounting principles. The fair value hierarchy is based on the valuation inputs used to measure an asset's fair value. The following provides a summary of the hierarchy used to measure fair value:

Level 1 - Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets.

Level 2 - Observable inputs other than Level 1 prices such as quoted prices for similar assets in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar assets in markets that are not active, or other inputs that are observable, either directly or indirectly.

Level 3 - Unobservable inputs should be developed using the best information available under the circumstances, which might include the District's own data. The District should adjust that data if reasonable available information indicates that other market participants would use different data or certain circumstances specific to the District are not available to other market participants.

Uncategorized - Investments in the Contra Costa County Treasury Investment Pool are not measured using the input levels above because the District's transactions are based on a stable net asset value per share. All contributions and redemptions are transacted at \$1.00 net asset value per share.

The District held \$71,343 in uncategorized investments related to the Measure E Bond Building Fund's investment in the Contra Costa County Treasury as of June 30, 2019

NOTE 3 – ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE

Accounts receivable as of June 30, 2019 in the amount of \$37,345 was related to a rebate payment for well maintenance.

NOTE 4 – ACCOUNTS PAYABLE

Accounts payable as of June 30, 2019 in the amount of \$178 related to accrued construction costs.

NOTE 5 – INTERFUND TRANSACTIONS

During the year ended June 30, 2019, the County School Facilities Fund transferred \$5,641 to the Measure E Bond Building Fund to reimburse for state school facilities projects.

NOTE 6 – MEASURE E GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS

On November 4, 2004 the District voters authorized \$40,500,000 in general obligation bonds (Measure E) to build new classrooms and schools and continuing the renovation and modernization of local schools. Also, Pittsburg Unified School District was authorized to repair, replace, acquire, construct and renovate school facilities and equipment.

2012 General Obligation Refunding Bonds

During the year ended June 30, 2013, the District issued \$13,265,000 in General Obligation Refunding Bonds. The Bonds were issued to advance refund a portion of the Election of 2004, Series A Bonds and current refund the 2003 Refunding Bonds. The Bonds require principal and interest payments through August 1, 2026. Annual interest rates for these Bonds range from 3.00% to 5.00%. The refunding transaction resulted in a net savings to the District of approximately \$835,000.

2015 General Obligation Refunding Bonds

During the year ended June 30, 2018, the District issued \$37,625,000 in General Obligation Refunding Bonds. The Bonds were issued to refund a portion of the Election of 2004, Series B Bonds (Measure E) and a portion of the Election of 2006, Series B Bonds (Measure J). The Bonds require principal and interest payments through August 1, 2039. Annual interest rates for these Bonds range from 3.00% to 5.00%. The refunding transaction resulted in a net savings to the District \$3,695,107 and a present value savings to the District of \$2,627,478. The annual requirements to amortize the District's 2015 refunding general obligation bonds outstanding as of June 30, 2019, are as follows:

2017 General Obligation Refunding Bonds

During the year ended June 30, 2018, the District issued \$20,305,000 in General Obligation Refunding Bonds. The bonds were issued to refund the remaining portions of the Election of 2004, Series C and Election of 2006, Series A bonds. The refunding transaction resulted in a net savings to the District \$4,477,349 and a present value savings to the District of \$3,500,526. This issuance refunded \$7,345,000 in Election of 2004, Series C bonds.

Independent Auditors' Report

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the Measure E Bond Building Fund of Pittsburg Unified School District (the "District"), as of and for the year ended June 30, 2019, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Pittsburg Unified School District's basic financial statements of the Measure E Bond Building Fund, and have issued our report thereon dated March 12, 2020.

Internal Control over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered Pittsburg Unified School District's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements of the Measure E Bond Building Fund, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Pittsburg Unified School District's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of Pittsburg Unified School District's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified

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Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Pittsburg Unified School District's financial statements of the Measure E Bond Building Fund are free from material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

Purpose of this Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the entity's internal control and compliance. Accordingly, this communication is not suitable for any other purpose.

Report on Performance

We have audited Pittsburg Unified School District's compliance with the performance audit procedures described in the 2018-19 Guide for Annual Audits of K-12 Local Education Agencies and State Compliance Reporting, prescribed in Title 5, California Code of Regulations, section 19810, that could have a direct and material effect on Pittsburg Unified School District's Measure E Bond Building Fund for the year ended June 30, 2019, as identified below.

Management's Responsibility

Management is responsible for compliance with the requirements of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants applicable to local school construction bonds.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on compliance of Pittsburg Unified School District's Measure E Bond Building Fund based on our performance audit of the types of compliance requirements referred to above. We conducted our performance audit in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards; the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; and the 2018-19 Guide for Annual Audits of K-12 Local Education Agencies and State Compliance Reporting, prescribed in Title 5, California Code of Regulations, section 19810. Those standards require that we plan and perform the performance audit to obtain sufficient, appropriate evidence to provide a reasonable basis for our findings and conclusions based on our audit objectives. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence about Pittsburg Unified School District's compliance with those requirements and performing such other procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

We believe that the evidence obtained in our performance audit provides a reasonable basis for our findings and conclusions based on our audit objectives. However, our audit does not provide a legal determination of Pittsburg Unified School District's compliance with those requirements.

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Opinion on Performance

In our opinion, Pittsburg Unified School District complied, in all material respects, with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that are applicable to the Measure E Bond Building Fund noted below for the year ended June 30, 2019.

Procedures Performed

In connection with the performance audit referred to above, we selected and tested transactions and records to determine Pittsburg Unified School District's compliance with the state laws and regulations applicable to the Financial Audit Procedures and Performance Audit Procedures over the Measure E Bond Building Fund. Additional agreed upon procedures relating the Measure E Bond Building Fund may also be included.

The results of the procedures performed and the related results are further described in the accompanying performance audit results following this Report on Performance.

SECTION I – FINANCIAL AUDIT PROCEDURES AND RESULTS

Financial Statements

As mentioned in the Report on Financial Statements, we have issued an unmodified opinion over the financial statements of the Measure E Bond Building Fund as of and for the year ended June 30, 2019.

Internal Control Evaluation

We tested internal controls over financial reporting and compliance with laws, regulations, or provisions of contracts or agreements and have determined through our inquiry of management and our evaluation of District processes that no significant deficiencies were noted.

SECTION II – PERFORMANCE AUDIT PROCEDURES AND RESULTS

Facility Project Expenditures

We selected a representative sample of expenditures charged to the Measure E Bond Building Fund and reviewed supporting documentation to ensure funds were properly expended on specific project(s) listed in the text of the Measure E ballot.

We tested approximately \$677 of non-personnel expenditures or 53% of total 2018-19 Measure E Bond Building Fund expenditures for validity, allowability and accuracy and concluded that the sampled expenditures were in compliance with the terms of Measure E ballot language, the District approved facilities plan, and applicable state laws and regulations.

Personnel Expenditures

We reviewed salaries and benefits charged to the Measure E Bond Building Fund to verify that the personnel expenditures were allowable per Opinion 04-110 issued on November 9, 2004 by the State of California Attorney General, which concluded that "a school district may use Proposition 39 school bond proceeds to pay the salaries of district employees to the extent they perform administrative oversight work on construction projects authorized by a voter approved bond measure." Based on review of expenditure information, we noted that there were no salaries or benefits charged to the Measure E Bond Building Fund during the year ended June 30, 2019. Audit procedures over personnel expenditures were not applicable.

Facilities Site Walk

We did not deem a site walk necessary as expenditures were related to closeout of monitoring wells during the year ended June 30, 2019.

Contract and Bid Procedures

For the year ended June 30, 2019, we inquired with District management to determine if any projects were sent to bid during the fiscal year. As a result, we determined there were no Measure E contracts awarded during the year ended June 30, 2019.

Contracts and Change Orders

For the year ended June 30, 2019, we inquired with District management to determine if any change orders were approved in accordance with District policies. As a result, we determined there were no change orders during the year ended June 30, 2019.

Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee (CBOC)

In accordance with Assembly Bill (AB) 1908 and Education Code (Ed Code) Section 15278, the District is required to establish a bond oversight committee for Proposition 39 bonds to include one active member from each of the following sectors: a business organization, senior citizens organization, bona fide taxpayers' association, parent/guardian of a child enrolled in the District and a parent/guardian of a child enrolled in the District and a parent/guardian of a child enrolled in the District to the citizens' oversight committee.

We found that the District successfully compiled a CBOC with an active member from each of the required representations. No members of the CBOC are also an employee, official, vendor or consultant of the District. Refer to the Introduction and CBOC Member Listing for current members as of June 30, 2019.
